

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

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

## WEMBLEY'S FOURTH RUGBY LEAGUE FINAL

After an absence of a year, brought about through the tour to Australia, the Rugby Football League returns to Wembley to-day for its Cup Final and in doing so stages its fourth final on this classic enclosure. The occasion is all the more important in that His Majesty the King has graciously expressed a desire to be present and the fact that Royal patronage has been bestowed on the professional Rugby game for the first time since its inception in 1895 has given the greatest satisfaction, not only to the Rugby League Officials, but to the countless thousands who follow the sport in the North. It needs no emphasis from me that their appreciation and loyalty will be shown by a deep-throated roar both when His Majesty arrives at the Stadium and when he presents the handsome Trophy to the captain of the winning team this afternoon.

This thirty-third Rugby League Challenge Cup Final is yet another struggle between the representatives of the Red and White Rose counties—Warrington and Huddersfield respectively. There is still the traditional rivalry between Lancashire and Yorkshire, but the enmity which existed between these counties during the Wars of the Roses in the fifteenth century has long been dead. There exists, however, the keenness of both to win on the field of sport and in the realm of football and cricket it is most pronounced. You will hear it in the good-natured banter that takes place between the rival factions on the occasion of any big Lancashire and Yorkshire sporting clash.

The Clubs who will strive their utmost to uphold the prestige of their counties have notable Cup records; in fact Huddersfield will go on the field of play to-day happy in the knowledge that not once in their three previous appearances have they known defeat—and Lancashire on each occasion has supplied the vanquished club. Warrington in 1913 was one of them. This is Warrington's seventh final. They have won two of the previous six. Neither Huddersfield nor Warrington, however, have had the honour of playing at Wembley before. Each has the reputation, justly obtained, of always

endeavouring to play the very best type of Rugby League football. They are firm believers in the open style of game, which means that they rely to a marked extent on the speed of their backs to score tries. They have gone far afield in their endeavour to secure the finest exponents of the game, and in the Huddersfield side two Australians, three Welshmen and a Coventry player will be found.

Warrington also have three Welshmen in addition to one Australian, the captain, and a Cumbrian. Another player was born in New Zealand, but he came to this country when a baby. The point, however, is that both clubs have been most successful in their search for talent and in favourable ground conditions this afternoon this Final tie should rank as one of the best ever seen. Huddersfield have a side which bears favourable comparison to the one which made Rugby League history between 1911 and 1915, when they won trophies galore, but in Warrington they will meet a team equally well endowed with players of repute, all trained to last out the full eighty minutes of this strenuous game. Young men there are in profusion on both sides; in fact the veteran of the 26 is Bentham, the Warrington forward, who is 30 years of age, but his experience is a great asset, for he has played regularly for his native county, Lancashire, and his Country for years.

Since the advent of the New Year Huddersfield, whose League record at that time did not even suggest they would have to be considered among this season's Cup challengers, set out on the task of team-building and the acquisition of Markham, Adams and Brindle in January wrought such a wonderful change that it was at once recognised they were a side of great possibilities. How well they have progressed may be seen from their record in their march to Wembley.

Warrington's team is one which has represented the club practically all the season, the only acquisition of recent date being Smith, second row forward, who with Adams, the Huddersfield half-back, was, strangely enough, with Leeds, the winners of the Cup last season, towards the end of 1932.

There will be one particular phase of this afternoon's game which should be most interesting, namely, the full back play of Holding and Scourfield respectively. Both are firm believers in making an additional three quarter back when the occasion permits and as both are equally sound in defence a great battle of wits should be the outcome. But, above all, watch Holding if he has any chances of placing goals. He can kick them from almost any angle and at considerable length. No wonder he has topped the century mark in goals for three successive seasons.

Both teams are happy in the possession of brilliant three quarters and half backs and among the forwards on

both sides are men who can handle a ball with almost the skill of a back. Two better balanced teams could hardly have been brought together as opponents and, knowing the players as I do, I think all can rest assured that the one aim and object of Warrington and Huddersfield will be to provide Rugby League football of the best — and without any ill-feeling.

It only remains for me to express the fervent wish that it will be a game which will give pleasure to all and that whoever wins, they will do so by merit. The pity of it is that one splendid side will have to be beaten, but, being true sportsmen, the vanquished will not begrudge the victors the honour.

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# POINTS TO NOTE

## in the Rugby League game.

### METHOD OF SCORING.

There are many rules in the Rugby League game which are very dis-similar to those of the Rugby Union and for those who are more conversant with the latter, these differences may prove of interest.

Only thirteen players are permitted on each side. This alteration was made with the object of speeding up the game.

The method of scoring is rather different from that of the Rugby Union game :—

A goal, whether it be scored through a drop, a penalty or a try, counts only two points.

When obtained from a try the scoring side is credited with one goal one try five points and not one goal five points, as under Rugby Union rules.

It is not possible to place a goal from a mark.

To find touch a player must first kick the ball so that it bounces on the playing side of the touch-line before going into touch. From penalty kicks, however, the ball may be kicked straight into touch as in the ordinary way under R.U. rules.

A half back, after playing the ball in the tunnel of the scrum, must immediately retire behind his pack and the ball must be heeled out by the "striker" who is in the centre of the front row. He is not permitted to go down on the knee to obtain possession.

The "play the ball" rule in a tackle is important. When a player is tackled only one man on each side may take part in the playing of the ball, which must be first placed on the ground before being kicked. Other players must not stand within five yards of the area of the two men playing the ball.

## PEN PICTURES of the HUDDERSFIELD TEAM

**TOM SCOURFIELD (Full-back).** Age twenty-three, height 5ft. 9in., weight 11st. 2lb. Welsh international. Formerly with Torquay Athletic. Joined Huddersfield, 1932. Has quickly developed into the best attacking full-back in the Rugby League, and is also sound defensive player.

**ERNEST MILLS (Right Wing-three-quarter).** Age twenty-six, height 5ft. 7½in., weight 11st. 7lb. An Australian, who signed for Huddersfield, 1927. Last season headed the Rugby League try-scoring list with fifty-two tries. Has the reputation of being the fastest wing in Rugby football.

**STANLEY BROGDEN (Right Centre-threequarter).** Age twenty-two, height 5ft. 8in., weight 10st. 8½lb. An English international, was transferred from Bradford to Huddersfield in 1929. One of the most successful players on the last Australian tour, and is still young enough to be England's first choice. A clever, resourceful and speedy centre.

**LEONARD C. BOWKETT (Right or Left Centre-threequarter, or Full-back).** Age twenty-seven, height 5ft. 7in., weight 11st. 12lb. A native of Coventry, who joined Huddersfield on December 14, 1926. Gained international honours. A great leader and a worthy captain. Has a tremendous capacity for hard work, and possesses a strong burst.

**RAY T. MARKHAM (Left Wing-threequarter).** Age twenty-two, height 5ft. 10in., weight 11st. 9lb. An Australian who arrived in Huddersfield on January 1st of this year. Shows promise of developing into a really great player. Combines speed with cleverness in beating his opponents.

**GWYN RICHARDS (Outside Half-back).** Age twenty-five, height 5ft. 7in., weight 10st. 4lb. Welsh international, formerly with Torquay Athletic. Joined Huddersfield, 1931. A very brainy player, and a worthy successor to Huddersfield's greatest half-backs.

**LESLIE ADAMS (Scrummage Half-back).** Age twenty-three, height 5ft. 6in., weight 10st. 7½lb. An English international. The latest

acquisition to Huddersfield, being transferred to the club from Leeds on January 27 of this year. Was a member of the last Australian touring team, and has also gained Yorkshire county honours. Quickly reached a fine understanding with Richards, as the Cup tournament has proved.

**HERBERT SHERWOOD (Front row forward).** Age twenty-three, height 6ft., weight 13st 12lb. Joined the club October 29, 1927. A Yorkshire County forward, and a young player who, apart from good work in the scrummages, is playing finely in the loose. Comes of a noted footballing family.

**S. CYRIL HALLIDAY (Hooker).** Age twenty-seven, height 5ft. 11in., weight 13st. Yorkshire County forward. Was transferred from Halifax to Huddersfield December 21, 1928. Has recently returned to his best form.

**THOMAS BANKS (Front row forward).** Age twenty-five, height 6ft., weight 13st. 3lb. A Yorkshire County forward. A native of Castleford, and joined Huddersfield in August, 1928. A robust, hard-working forward, also good in the loose.

**HENRY TIFFANY (Second row forward).** Age twenty-six, height 5ft. 10in., weight 13st. 4lb. A local product, who signed for the club in August, 1924. Is the oldest player in service, but not in years. A grand forward in all phases of the game.

**FREDERICK TALBOT (Second row forward).** Age twenty-three, height 5ft. 11in., weight 12st. 2lb. A native of Ebbw Vale. Joined the club January 5, 1931. A speedy and intelligent forward, and a rare companion for Tiffany.

**FREDERICK BRINDLE (Loose forward).** Age twenty-three, height 6ft., weight 12st. 10lb. English international. Transferred to Huddersfield from Hull Kingston Rovers January 4 of this year. Is already a first-class loose forward, and since coming to Huddersfield has won recognition by the England selectors. A vigorous, hard-working and resourceful forward.

## PEN PICTURES of the WARRINGTON TEAM

**W. J. HOLDING (Full-back).** Age twenty-four, height 5ft. 9½in., weight 11st. 7lb. Born in Maryport, Cumberland. One of the best goal kickers in the British Isles; during the last three seasons has kicked over a hundred goals in each. Has played for Cumberland on five occasions and was reserve for England in this season's International match.

**T. THOMPSON (Left Wing-three-quarter).** Age twenty-three, height 5ft. 8½in., weight 12st. 6lb. Born in Wigan. Joined Warrington in 1927 as a Junior Reserve for Lancashire County. One of the best side-steppers in the Rugby League game. His best performance was when he scored the whole of the 17 points for Warrington when they beat the Australians in 1929.

**W. DINGSDALE (Left Centre-threequarter).** Age twenty-six, height 5ft. 11in., weight 12st. 4lb. Born in St. Helens. One of England's best centre-threequarters. Has played in eight International matches, including two of the tests against the Australians in 1929. Is in possession of two Lancashire Cup and three County Championship Medals. Was a member of the touring side which visited Australia and New Zealand last summer.

**W. J. SHANKLAND (Right Centre-threequarter and Captain).** Age twenty-five, height 5ft. 10½in., weight 12st. 8lb. Born in Sydney and joined Warrington last season. Visited England with the Australian touring side in 1929 and played in all four tests against England. Was the highest scorer in the party with 25 tries and 17 goals. Also played for Australia in test matches against New Zealand. Has a wonderful side step and kicks a tremendous length. Also hits a golf ball to some purpose. Is Assistant Professional under E. W. H. Kenyon, the famous Golfer, at the West Lancs. Golf Club. Bill also played for other nationalities against England this season.

**T. BLINKHORN (Right wing-three-quarter).** Age twenty-eight, height 5ft. 8in., weight 13st. Born in Wigan. Has played for Warrington for four seasons. A most versatile player and has occupied every position except scrum-half. Played for

England against the other nationalities, also against the Australians in the deciding test match at Rochdale in 1930.

**J. OSTER (Stand off half-back).** Age twenty-seven, height 5ft. 7½in., weight 10st. 10lb. Born in Wigan. Quick at seeing an opening and very elusive. A Lancs. County and International player. Played for the Northern Rugby League against the Australians at Wigan and Newcastle in 1929 and for England in the Test Match against the Australians at Swinton in 1930.

**D. M. DAVIES (Scrum-half-back).** Age twenty-eight, height 5ft. 8in., weight 10st. 10lb. Born at Glan-ammon and before joining Warrington played with Neath Rugby Union team. Has played Rugby League International on three occasions and also played for the Northern Rugby League club against the Australians in 1929. Is without doubt one of the trickiest and fastest scrum halves playing Rugby League game at the present time.

**J. MILLER (Front row forward).** Age twenty-five, height 5ft. 9½in., weight 14st. 10lb. Born at Newton-le-Willows, near Warrington. He joined the Warrington club in 1926 and is a real 80 minutes player. Played International against Wales, also against other Internationals at Workington this season. Was a member of the Warrington Cup Final team in 1928.

**N. BENTHAM (Hooker).** Age thirty, height 5ft. 8½in., weight 14st. Born in Wigan. Played for Lancashire and England regularly from 1927 to 1930, including the four Test Matches against the last Australasian touring side. Was one of the side to tour Australasia in 1928 and played in all six test matches in Australia and New Zealand.

**S. HARDMAN (Front row forward).** Age twenty-three, height 5ft. 10in., weight 14st. Born in Warrington and learned his football with a junior team called Ashton Recs. Played for Lancs. County against Yorkshire this season. Is probably the best dribbler in the Warrington team.

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

**R. SMITH (Second row forward).** Age twenty-four, height 6ft., weight 13st. 12lb. Born at Wigan. Joined Warrington from the Leeds Club a few months ago. Has assisted Lancs. County on 12 occasions and also played for the Northern Rugby League team against the Australians at Newcastle in 1929.

**A. EVANS (Second row forward).** Age twenty-seven, height 6ft. 2½in., weight 15st. 7lb. Played Rugby Union International against England, Ireland and France and is also a Rugby League International.

"Candy" held the heavy-weight amateur boxing championship of Wales. Is the giant of the Warrington team and takes a tremendous amount of stopping.

**C. SEELING (Loose forward).** Age twenty-five, height 5ft. 11in., weight 13st. 11lb. Born in New Zealand. Came to England when 2 years of age. A most brainy player and is son of Charlie Seeling, the famous All Black, who was one of the best forwards to visit England with a Colonial touring side. Young Charlie was lucky enough to draw a horse in the last Grand National Irish Sweep.
