May we again appeal for loose coupons for Fartown football kit. We have had a few coupons handed in as the result of our recent appeal. We're only asking for one or two coupons per person and this not to the extent of hardship or sacrifice. Spare coupons are what we are "after." Please hand in, or post, to the Pavilion. We shall be pleased.

A fortnight ago, Keighley came to Fartown for the "return" and deservedly triumphed by 19 points to 16. The absence of Belshaw and Peake weakened our side while, on the other hand, Keighley, with Emlyn Jenkins and other "guest" players, were a stronger combination than was the side we met and defeated earlier on at Lawkholme Lane. This Fartown match provided a very interesting and pleasing game with the visitors the nipper and more workmanlike combination.

Last week-end's convincing victory over Hull at the Boulevard, in the 1st stage, 1st round Yorkshire Cuptie (we won 20 points to 3) must have exceeded the expectations of the most optimistic Fartowner. In justice to Hull it must be stated their side lacked the services of several first rate players while we were able to field possibly our very best side. It is doubtful if we have played so good a game in any previous match during this War-time period. To-day we hope our Hull friends will be able to field their strongest side and that once more we shall find ourselves in the same happy position. We may be thankful for our 17 points start ere the final whistle to-day.
