Sydney Harbour Bridge

Opened for traffic in 1932. The largest arch bridge in the world. Its total length, with rail and road approaches, is 2\(\frac{1}{2}\) miles. The main bridge consists of a steel arch span of 1,550 feet. The highest point is 440 feet above sea-level, and the clearance for shipping under the deck of the bridge is 170 feet at high water. The deck is 160 feet wide and it carries a roadway, railway and tram tracks, and footways.







Message from Australia

The Rt. Hon. J. A. BEASLEY

HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR AUSTRALIA

AM told that the Australian Rugby League side, the "Kangaroos", hope to win back the "Ashes" from England this year. This will require a great effort because since 1920 all other Australian Rugby League sides have failed to succeed. But, following on the successful tour of the Rugby Union team, the "Wallabies", I cannot believe that a double success for Australia-League and Union-would be beyond the realms of possibility.

There is no doubt that the "Kangaroos" have the job in front of them. They can and do expect formidable opposition from the English teams on their home grounds. They respect and know the type of courage which will be pitted against them, as many of the "Kangaroos" fought side by side with servicemen from Great Britain in the recent World War. And courageous action on the sports field is as vital to the result of a game as it is to the result of a battle.

But there will be little of the element of battle in this forthcoming tour. The spirit that has always been shown in sporting duels between Britain and Australia will be carried forward in the same style by the "Kangaroos". Our sportsmen have always been among our best ambassadors of goodwill and I can write, with all sincerity, that the "Kangaroos" will continue to carry that spirit of good fellowship into each game in the manner that has become the hallmark of Australian sportsmen both at home and in countries beyond Australian shores.

ERIC J. SIMMONDS (Business Manager)

Eric J. Simmonds, age 44, hails from Brisbane, and is the secretary of the Queensland Rugby Football League. In his playing days was a half back and played First Grade football in Brisbane. A leg injury brought his playing days to an early end. Entered the administrative side of the game in 1934 and became a Club delegate to the Brisbane Rugby League. At the first meeting of the Brisbane Rugby League that he attended was elected a member of the Management Committee. The following year he became Chairman of the Brisbane Rugby League. In 1937 became a Vice President of the Queensland Rugby League and in September 1938 became Secretary of the League which position he still holds. He is a member of the Australian Rugby League Board of Control and is the Hon. Treasurer. In private life is a Solicitor.



WILLIAM GEORGE BUCKLEY (Team Manager)

William George Buckley, age 41, began his football career in 1918 as a schoolboy footballer, and continued in this sphere until 1922. In 1923 he became a country player also Secretary of the Queanbeyan (N.S.W.) Club. In 1925 he played with Newtown Club President Cup Team. From 1926 to 1931 played with the Newtown D.R.L.F. 1926 to 1931 played with the Newtown D.R.L.F. Club in 60 matches in the First and Reserve Grade, but was forced to retire from active football after breaking his leg. The following year, 1932, Mr. Buckley was elected a Vice-President of the New-town D.R.L.F. Club and Selector, and carried out these duties until 1939. In 1939 he was appointed Delegate from the Newtown D.R.L.F. Club to the N.S.W. Rugby Football League. It was also in this year that he joined the A.I.F., serving in Palestine, Egypt, Libya, Syria and Darwin until discharged in 1944. Mr. Buckley, on his discharge, once again took his place as Delegate to the N.S.W. Rugby Football League from the Newtown D.R.L.F. Club. The following year, 1945, he was elected a Vice-President of the N.S.W. Rugby Football League, which position he continues to hold at the present Occupation-Shipping Clerk,

Famous Players of the Past



"DALLY" MESSENGER

"The Master"

"DALLY" MESSENGER

Honoured in England as well as in Australia as "The Master". From the first day he played R.U. football Messenger was hailed as a coming champion and his paralysing performances against clubs, States and Nations would fill a book.

Height 5 ft. 7 in., weight 12 st., and grandson of a one-time champion sculler of England, "Dally" was one of the pioneers of the Rugby League code in Australia. At centre three-quarter he was supreme and he did things that shocked the conventional and violated the orthodox with a cool confidence and grace that beggared description.

Was Australia's Captain, centre three-quarter and goal-kicker. In 1911 scored eight tries and 24 goals against Queensland; two tries and 16 goals against New Zealand and altogether landed 108 goals during the season in 21 matches.

In a kicking exhibition in England with the 1907-08 "All Blacks" he kicked 11 goals in 12 shots AGAINST the wind and another 11 out of 12 WITH the wind.

Toured England in 1907-08 with the New Zealand "All Blacks" R.U. team and again in 1908-09 with the original "Kangaroos" R.L. side. He was selected for the 1911 "Kangaroos" trip to England but declined the invitation.

HAROLD HORDER

Rated the greatest wing three-quarter the Rugby League code has ever known. Jumped direct from a Third grade Junior side to the famous South Sydney senior team, at 18 years of age, and scored a sensational "goal-line" try in his first game.

Toured New Zealand when 19 years of age, and played in his first "Test" against "The Old Country" in 1914, at the age of 20. In all played in nine "Tests" against England from 1914 to 1924. Toured England with the 1921 "Kangaroos" when his displays captivated the English crowds.

Playing for New South Wales against Queensland in 1915 he scored 10 tries and kicked 15 goals in two games within two days, a total of 60 points.

In all first-class matches he totalled 307 tries and 268 goals, an aggregate of 1457 points.

Horder's amazing swerve and sidestep at bewildering speed, his lightning intelligence in play and his ability to kick goals with the best stamped him as a football wonder and his scoring feats would today have earned him the title of "The Bradman of Rugby League."

HAROLD WAGSTAFF

The late Harold Wagstaff, affectionately known to all as "Wagsy", will always be regarded as "A Great Player and a Great Englishman".

As a centre-three-quarter he had few peers and as England's Captain he possessed all the attributes essential for success as evidenced in the great "Rorke's Drift" Test referred to on another page.

A member of the Huddersfield "Team of all the Talents", he played in Nine "Tests" against Australia from 1911 to 1921, touring Australia in 1914 and 1920 as Captain.

Although not in the list of record holders Harold in some respects could be likened to "Dally" Messenger for doing unorthodox things in a pinch. It is on record that in a match in Australia in 1914, when faced by three Australians, he threw the ball a few feet in the air. The Aussies not knowing what was coming next from the brain of "Waggy" opened out a few yards and in a flash Harold had caught the ball again and was through and over the line Such was the way the great player's brain worked during a match.

IIM SULLIVAN

Recognised by all as the World's greatest full-back and considered by many Australians as Great Britain's other "Rock of Gibraltar". A product of Welsh Rugby Union, Jim joined Wigan in 1921, at the age of 17 and had an illustrious career in club, International and "Test" football until season 1946 when he retired with "honours thick upon him". Played in fifteen "Tests" against Australia, visited the Antipodes three times (once as Captain—in 1932) and selected for the fourth time in 1936 but declined the invitation.

Kicked over 100 goals in every season (except 1946), including the record number of 200 goals in 1934.

Altogether scored over 100 tries and kicked over 3,000 goals—an amazing record indeed.

"Rorke's Drift"

HAROLD WAGSTAFF ON 1914 CLASSIC

No greater example of the tenacity of the footballers of the bulldog breed could be found than that historic Third Test, in Sydney, on July 4, 1914—the "Rorke's Drift" Test.

England's leader that day was Harold Wagstaff, and the way he kept rallying the players left under him was one of the marvels of Test football.

England, at one stage, was reduced to nine men, but several struggled back on to the field and, eventually, the side won the match—and the "Ashes".

The 1914 tour had a disastrous start. We lost the first two matches and our football was poor, because we were not fit.

I was called into conference by the managers, and my suggestion was that we should straightaway get down to it—that we should go to the ground every morning, have lunch sent to us there, and continue training in the afternoon until we felt we had had enough.

Everyone in the side tackled the business keenly, and we made a quick and entirely satisfactory revival. It was a revival so satisfactory, at all events, that when the First Test was played, on the Agricultural Ground, we were able to win comfortably.

Yet, we took the field for that match without a regular full-back. Alf Wood had broken his nose and Gwyn Thomas had a fractured rib, and we had to play Bill Jarman, the Leeds forward, at full-back.

We got 23 points, and Australia did not score until the last five minutes, 23—5 was good enough.

The Second Test was played the following Monday—King's Birthday—and because Jarman, Longstaff, Moorhouse and Bert Jenkins were injured, we were hard put to to get a team.

We were beaten 12—7, and so the position in the battle for the "Ashes" stood one each.

The arrangement was that the final Test would be played in Melbourne when we returned from New Zealand.

An England v. N.S.W. game was fixed for Sydney the following Saturday and, on the Wednesday morning, Mr. J. Clifford, one of our managers, took a team to Bathurst. Then the Australians began an agitation for the Third Test to be played in place of the N.S.W. v. England game.

Mr. Clifford could not be consulted and, eventually, the Australian authorities cabled to England to ask the Northern Union Council to agree to the Third Test being played, as Australia desired.

A special meeting of the Northern Union Council was called in England, they agreed to the Australian demand and sent the following message to the English party in Australia:

"Play match as Australians desire. England expects that every man will do his duty."

So it came about that the Third Test was played on the Saturday following the First —just think of it, three Tests in eight days for a touring team crippled by injury.

Anyway, Alf Wood decided to take the full-back position, though his nose was far from right, and we turned out this side:

Wood; Frank Williams, Hall, Wagstaff, W. A. Davies; Smith, Prosser; Holland, Coldrick, Ramsdale, Johnson, Clark, Chilcott.

The Australian side was: Hallett; Frawley, Deane, Tidyman, W. Messenger; Fraser, Halloway; Burge, Courtney, Craig, Sullivan, Pearce, Cann.

My first memory of the day on which that match, which came to be known as the "Rorke's Drift" match, was played has to do with the fighting speech that was made to us by Mr. J. Clifford.

"Rorke's Drift" (continued)

He called the men who were playing that afternoon—the 13 of us—into a room at the hotel and he outlined the whole story of the revision of the fixture. Then he said that he expected every one of us to play as we had never played before.

You are playing in a game of football this afternoon, he told us, but more than that, you are playing for England. Don't forget that message from home: England expects every one of you to do his duty.

The men in my team were moved. I was impressed and thrilled as never before or since by a speech. You could see our fellows clencing their fists as Mr. Clifford spoke, and I know that when we left the room none of us spoke.

We were prepared to go all out when we went on to that field in Sydney, but, before there had been a scrum, Frank Williams, on the wing, had twisted his leg.

We took "Chick" Johnson out of the pack to help Williams on that wing.

We managed to lead 9—3 at half-time. Percy Coldrick had scored a try and Alf Wood had kicked three goals.

Immediately we started the second half, Douglas Clark smashed his collarbone. He had broken a thumb in the first half and it had been bandaged tightly so that he could continue.

In the early stages of the second half, Clark got a pass and went racing clear of all, it seemed, for the line, but "Pony" Halloway challenged him.

Douglas put out his hand to push Halloway off and then remembered his broken thumb. He withdrew the hand and went in to Halloway to give him his shoulder, but Halloway "staffed", and Clark, unable to recover his balance, fell on his shoulder and the collarbone went. He had it strapped and, twice, he made an effort to return to the game, but in the end, he had to realise that it was impossible for him to carry on. There were tears in his eyes when he left the field the last time.

Frank Williams hurt his leg again and he had to go off, and we were left with 11 men.

Then Billy Hall, of Oldham, was carried off with concussion—he received the injury when he went down on the ball—and we had 10 men to face 13.

Ten men and 30 minutes to go! But never had I nine such men with me on a football field as I had that day. We were in our own half all the time and, for most of the time, we seemed to be on our line but we stuck it. Our forwards gave their all.

In the scrummages the remnants of the pack that was left did its job and, in the loose, the men who had been brought out tackled as fiercely and as finely as the backs did. "Chick" Johnson, on one wing, and Percy Coldrick on the other, and Willie Davies in the centre with me.

As often happens in such circumstances, we continued to win the ball from the scrums. Holland, Ramsdale and Chilcott were heroes. There were 20 minutes left when I managed to cut through, after taking the ball from Fred Smith and Prosser. I went to Johnson's wing and, when I gave "Chick" the ball, there was only the full-back in front of him.

"Chick" went away with it, but then none of us dreamt that we were to witness the scoring of as wonderful a try as Test football ever will produce.

A few yards from the Australian full-back, Hallett, Johnson put the ball on the ground and began to dribble. He had half the length of the field to go, but he did it. And the ball never left his toes. It might have been tied with a piece of string to his feet, so perfectly did he control it.

No soccer international could have dribbled a ball better than did Johnson that afternoon on the Sydney Cricket Ground. Man after man he beat until, finally, he tapped the ball over the line and dropped on it.

Alf Wood kicked the goal and there we were, 14—3. Billy Hall recovered and came back for the last 10 minutes to help us in a defence that was successful until in the last few minutes, Sid Deane scored Australia's second trv.

But the victory was ours and the Assistatian crowd gave us the full credit for it. They swing round to our side in the second half, and they were with us to the end, cheering us on in inspiring fashion. When the final whistle sounded we were done. We had gone to the last gasp, and were just about finished.
